Duane Jackson grew up in a children's home ⁱⁿ east London. "Then I took	1
the usual path," says the 34-year-old, "to ^{hanging} <u>hang</u> around with the wrong	2
crowd." He got the kicked out of school at 15 and, five years later, was	3
arrested in Atlanta, Georgia, for ^{trafficking} <u>trafficing</u> 6,500 ecstasy tablets. He	4
served two years in prison in ^{the} UK. "On my release, I found it hard to get	5
a job because of this black hole on my CV," says Jackson. "So I decided to	
start my own company." His startup currently employs some 40 people,	6
providing online accounting software for more than 2,000 startups. ^{its} <u>it's</u>	7
revenues are around £2 million.	
Jackson taught himself to programme using a ZX Spectrum ^{when} <u>while</u> he was	8
at the children's home, and later taught IT skills to prison inmates. Then	
he came across the Prince's Trust, a foundation that helps young people	9
start their own businesses. "I started as a freelance web developer, but	
quickly realised that all the accounting software out there was over-	
complicated, full ^{of} jargon and horrible to use," he says. "So I decided to	10
make ^{my} <u>own</u> software and sell it as a product."	11
The Prince's Trust provided a £4,000 grant, a connection that also led of	12
him to meet Lord Young, enterprise adviser to David Cameron, who	
invested in Jackson's startup and now ^{serves} <u>surves</u> as its chairman. "Drug	13
dealing is very entrepreneurial," says the Jackson. "But in prison, I	14
realised the cause and effect between your actions and where you end	
up."
